When I was young, we boys would periodically have a bout of "My Dad is better than your Dad." We'd throw out some awesome feat... NEVER embellished or exaggerated.. that our Dads did, that was obviously an achievement that clearly made him the "Dad over all". While that was fun (even if it was more than a little bit of perjury if we'd have done it in a court of law), what is cute as kids, often becomes ugly as adults...especially with Christians.

More and more on social media, I see other Christians rolling out some blog or scathing video about "nationally-known pastor" or "those type of churches". It always makes me cringe, because rarely is anyone ever pointing at themselves and their church in repentance. Mostly, it's a finger pointing exercise at the "really bad" Christians over there...that aren't me.

A defining statement like John 13:35 gets thrown away. Matthew 18, Galatians 6 and Proverbs 16:18 are ignored. It's like trying to find the next "sinner" to expose has become the national distraction for what Christians should be doing. If that's you, let me share something with you...you don't have to search for sinners, because we all are and if someone says they aren't, then they are lying...which is a sin.

As a fellow believer in Boston told me recently, "no one ever says that the problem with the church is that we've got TOO many people telling others about Jesus." Like anything else, purpose gets lost in the wake of distraction. What's sad is this rash of stuff rarely produces solution, only division. It is really just an indirect method of pointing to how YOU have it all together...leaving Jesus out of the equation. That type of stuff between Christians really just ends up looking like two second graders, fighting about whose Dad is better. and then you come to find out that they are siblings and the "Dads" they are comparing is the same guy.

Don't seek out the "angry ones" who live to create conflict as your influences. If you see someone caught in a sin, resist the urge to run to Facebook, Twitter or Sunday School to nail them with your cool insult, no matter how famous or wrong they appear to be. I want to do that too, sometimes, but even though it's hard, try praying for them instead. I really fail more than I'd like to admit, but it's always better when I succeed. Spend 1000 times as many words as you ever say about someone in criticism, either in loving restorative (sometimes difficult) words to them directly or in talking to the only One who can ever make a real difference (See Gal 6, Matthew 18, etc..). You might find yourself more compassionate than contrary, or maybe even becoming more "Christlike"...and if that happens, maybe your Dad will, with lack of comparison, brag on you.

"The Swamp" is a dangerous place, for your hearing

I recently saw a new patient for a hearing aid repair, who presented with a classic noise induced, moderate to severe, what we call ski slope loss. It was complete with what is known as, the boiler maker's notch at 4K Hz. As this loss was on a nurse about twenty years younger than myself, I was curious about her noise exposure, and how she had gotten her hearing loss.

Expecting that perhaps she was a veteran, exposed to a lot of gunfire, and explosions, or maybe an emergency helicopter flight nurse, or such, as those types of noise exposure often cause such losses, I was really surprised when she told me that she had been exposed to none of that, nor any other recreational exposure, save one.

No, this gal had lived a quiet, protected life, excepting one thing, she confessed that she was a longtime season ticket holder to the Florida Gator's games. She also advised that when she left the games, her ears would ring for hours afterward. She had mentioned the issue with her ENT, but had been told that the sound levels at a football game couldn't be loud enough to cause a hearing loss. Yet, here she was, with all evidence of a noise induced loss. While it never pays to argue with an ENT, what I was seeing in this patient clearly indicated noise induced loss. My own training in hearing conservation taught that time and intensity of exposure really adds up at higher sound levels. So, I went back to the tables and studies, and did a little research.

The Occupational Safety, and Health Administration, or OSHA, limits workplace exposure, and has tables for safe exposure based on time and noise levels. Their chart tops out at 115 dB SPL for fifteen minutes without ear protection.

Florida Stadium, known as "The Swamp", has had the noise level on their sidelines actually measured at sustained levels of 125 dB during games, which last an average of four hours. The noise levels drop a little below this during halftime, then resumes.

Based upon the best evidence we have, there simply is no safe, unprotected time exposure to the levels of sound found in "The Swamp".

It seems that while we've done a really good job at controlling dangerous noise levels in the workplace, we've turned a mostly blind eye toward a favored recreational pursuit, football. Clearly, with noise levels literally off the allowable charts, every fan, player, and employee in the stadium, is at risk of permanent hearing loss, from unprotected exposure to even one game.

The lesson, and my message from this, is that your hearing is a delicate thing. Even fabulously fun things, like a Gator game, may hold unexpected dangers for your hearing. Though this type of loss may not indicate immediately, other than with some ringing for a few hours afterwards, the damage has been done, and the loss when it displays will be permanent.

So, don't end up a deaf old Gator! Wear

your ear protection when around any loud noise exposure. Or else, you'll be seeing me, or a colleague before your time. Be smart, protect the hearing you have. Please see our advertisement on page 25 of this issue of Spotlight.

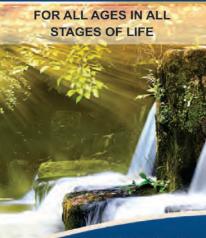
An Unexpected Gift

As I speak to my clients on a daily basis, I have found that when they are able to change their attitudes and thoughts, behavior changes happen quite quickly. 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ARTICLE:

I watched it hop along from a distance while I struggled with thoughts of insecurity about the responsibilities that lay ahead. The "what ifs" and "should dos" crowded my existence as lists of things to be done that day were prioritized in my mind.

The little bird, once unaware and undisturbed by my

Safe Ways to Trick-or-Treat

What would Halloween be without trick-

or-treating? For youngsters, so much of the fun of Halloween involves scouring the neighborhood with friends in search of candy. While children may have their eyes on the sweet prize, parents may be concerned about their little ones' safety.

The United States Census Bureau says that an average of 41 million trick-or-treaters venture out every year across the country, and roughly 106 million homes are solicited for candy and other treats on this holiday. Such a high number of people out on the streets increases the risk of injury, and it can be easy for kids to get lost as well.



According to Kate Carr, president and CEO of Safe Kids Worldwide, a network of organizations geared toward preventing unintentional childhood injury, "Halloween is an important night for parents to be extra vigilant." But Halloween seems to lessen one's inhibitions, and wearing a costume and being hidden from others can encourage some revelers to engage in atypical and unsafe behaviors. To ensure everyone has a safe and fun Halloween, here are some safety tips to follow.

GO IN GROUPS. Children can be accompanied by their parents while older children should be encouraged to trick-or-treat in groups. Should an emergency occur, having a group of friends around enables someone to call for help or alert an adult.

USE A FLASHLIGHT. When trick-or-treating at night, take steps to improve visibility. This includes using reflective tape on costumes and carrying a flashlight or glow sticks so that other pedestrians as well as drivers will be able to see children.

WALK ON SIDEWALKS. Wherever possible, trickor-treaters should use sidewalks and crosswalks. Avoid walking in the street, where the risk of being hit by a car is considerable. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says twice as many kids are hit by a car while walking on Halloween than any other day of the year. **AVOID DISTRACTIONS.** Trick-

or-treaters should not be wearing earbuds or talking on a phone while trick-or-treating. They should be paying attention to their surroundings and using caution.

DO NOT ENTER HOMES. If an adult or even a youngster whom a child does not know offers entry to the home, the trick-or-treater should not enter. Let kids know they should only enter the homes of known friends, and even then they should only do so after getting permission from a parent.

CONSUME ONLY FACTORY-WRAPPED TREATS. Well-meaning people may hand out cupcakes

or marshmallow cereal treats. The ingredients such people used and the safety of these treats cannot be confirmed, so it is best to stick with store-bought items instead.

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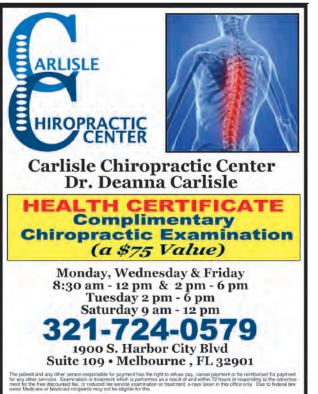
BACK TO SCHOOL NUTRITION SPOTLIGHT ON CHIROPRACTIC HEALTH

We often hear that good posture is essential for good health. We As a

doctor and a mother I want to remind parents of the important role nutrition plays in assuring kids a successful school year. Nutrition and learning go hand in hand. Kids who are nutritionally fit are more likely to have the energy, stamina and self-esteem that enhance their ability to learn. Running out the door with thoughts of seeing old classmates, joining new clubs, participating in school sports and (hopefully!) getting good grades, kids will not be paying much attention to the proper nutrition needed to accomplish all of this.

We have often heard it said that breakfast is the most important meal of the day, yet 35-40 percent of



all Americans skip breakfast. The statistics for children are just as alarming, as many as 48 percent of girls and 32 percent of boys do not eat breakfast every day. Start with a healthy breakfast. For children and teens a morning meal is especially important to prepare them to meet the challenges of learning. Many studies have shown that those who eat a morning meal tend to perform better in school, score higher on tests, have higher school attendance, less tardiness, better concentration and muscle coordination...and kids who eat breakfast have fewer hunger induced stomachaches and are less likely to be overweight.

As for lunch, meals served at school contribute significantly to kids

overall nutrient and energy needs. Do you know what they are eating? School meals are usually regulated through the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Through USDA guidance many schools are improving the nutritional quality of lunch and designing the meals to supply about one-third of a child's nutrition needs.

Parents can play a role in helping a child choose healthful meals in several ways. Keep the school lunch menu in your kitchen, go over it with your child,



and talk with your child about making choices in the cafeteria line. Get involved and work with school staff to form a parent advisory committee for the school food service program.

If your child prefers to brown bag it to school, let your child help plan and prepare school lunches. When they're involved, chances are they will resist trading their carrots for cookies. Pack meals that are easy to prepare and fun to eat as well as nutritious. A few examples are sandwiches, raw veggies, crackers, string cheese, whole fruit and yogurt or pudding.

Finally, for after-school snacks choose foods that supply needed nutrients that can be missed in meal choices. Stock up with ready-to-eat fruits and vegetables, animal crackers, popcorn and cereal. Your child will appreciate the availability of quick healthy snacks.

Proper nutrition is crucial for social, emotional and psychological development. Teaching children how to eat healthy will enable them to establish a foundation of good nutrition and healthful lifestyle habits that will benefit them for the rest of their lives.





MEASURE TWICE, CUT ONCE

My uncle was more than just a good carpenter, he was a master craftsman. It

was partly because of his influence and example, that I developed an interest in wood working. Part of being "pretty good" in woodworking is careful measuring. I can't tell you how many times my Uncle (or Bruno, the shop foreman where I worked in college) would say "Measure twice, cut once." I remember thinking once or twice, seriously, what a waste of time when one measurement would do the job. Now, I'm sure you see this coming, but it's really easy to misread a measuring tape. Continually discovering that your measurement is wrong after you make the cut, not only costs you money but affects job security.

So, if you are going to do any woodworking, the old rule of thumb: "Measure twice, cut once" is well worth the extra time.





When it comes to living, Luke 10:27 offers the best rule of thumb. Surely, Jesus offered this summary of the law many times and in many different forms during his ministry. It may even be that the "expert in religious law" in Luke 10 had heard Jesus and mirrored back

what Jesus had said. Be that as it may, whether on the lips of Jesus or a legal expert, the fact remains that the Gospels provide us with a "measure twice, cut once" guide for optimum living: "You must love the LORD your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your strength, and all your mind. And Love your neighbor as yourself".

Jesus does not go into great detail in this passage about exactly what it means for one to love God and neighbor, but from other passages of Scripture, we learn the rule of thumb that focuses on loving God and loving others serves as a reliable guide for how to live.

Simple to say ... Actually doing this is another story.

Sometimes I don't know how to love others. And, sometimes, I know what love requires, but I don't want to do it.

When I am unsure of how to act, may I return to this basic rule of thumb; to act in love, even when it is scary, even when it requires sacrifice, even when it is contrary to my inclination.

WHY MEGAPIXEL RATINGS ARE MISLEADING SPOTLIGHT ON COMPUTING

Digital camera specs on a smartphone can be complex to evaluate for the non-techie buyer and the industry long ago chose to focus on the magging rating to simplify

focus on the megapixel rating to simplify marketing messages. But the truth is, having a higher megapixel spec does not make a camera better.

There are two primary benefits to a higher megapixel count: Large format printing and cropping images, which are two things that most smartphone owners rarely do. If you primarily upload pictures to Facebook or another photo sharing site and view them via a computer monitor or mobile device, the megapixel count of just about any smartphone is more than you need.

Images that are uploaded to the Internet generally get compressed, which means pixels are removed to save space and decrease load times. If you primarily view the images on your computer, unless you have a super high-resolution computer monitor, a 5-megapixel image is more than sufficient to provide you with a brilliant full screen image.

If you plan on printing high-resolution images, a 5-megapixel image is also

more than sufficient for very crisp 8x10 prints.

Where the additional pixels can come in handy is when you are photographing something far away. Most smartphone cameras that offer any type of zoom incorporate digital zoom, which is nothing more than an unsophisticated cropping tool. You're better off not using any type of digital zoom with a higher megapixel camera so you can crop it tighter with a decent image-editing program afterwards. In this case, the more megapixels the original image has, the tighter you can crop without major visual impact when you resize the image.

Features that are much more important to the overall quality of a smartphone camera are things like the size of the image sensor and lens, the quality of the optics, and the software on the phone that allows you to make adjustments (such as ISO) while you are taking the picture.

If image quality is really important to you, I'd suggest that you ignore the megapixel rating and focus on the size





of the image sensor first. If it also has a large megapixel rating, all the better. An inexpensive 8-megapixel point-andshoot camera will generally blow away a 12-megapixel-smartphone camera, especially in low light situations, because the image sensor is substantially larger in a regular camera

The ability to detect and capture light is the single most important function of any digital camera and smartphones just don't have the space for large image sensors and lenses, which is why images shot in low lighting with a smartphone are generally grainy. There are some smartphone manufacturers that are starting to use larger image sensors and lenses on their smartphones, but you often lose the sleek form factor that you may want.

There are actually a couple of reasons why more megapixels could be a bad thing: image quality and storage. In order to satisfy the marketing departments demand for a higher megapixel rating in a thin phone, the engineers have to use smaller individual pixels, which impacts image quality because the pixels are less sensitive to light. Higher megapixel ratings also make each image larger, meaning that all of your storage devices (phone, computer, online accounts, etc.) will fill up faster for something your eye generally can't actually see.

This January the city of Indian Harbor Beach banned feral cats on community land, particularly on complaints of four residents. The IHB town council did not research any of the allegations from residents, (misinformation on rabies, toxoplasmosis, and rodent increase), but instead took it all as fact and banned feral cats from IHB. With only 400 words to get my message across I have to cut to the chase. Below is a letter to the town council of IHB. We will make sure they get into the correct hands.

To: The Indian Harbor Beach Mayor & City Council

October 2013

On January 8, 2013, the Indian Harbor Beach City Council voted to ban community (feral and abandoned stray) cats on all public property within City limits and gave specific caregivers until December 31, 2013, to trap and relocate remaining cats in Gleason Park. As an advocate for No-Kill, I respectfully request that the Indian Harbor Beach Mayor & City Council reconsider this decision and allow the cats that are there to live out the remainder of their lives. Allow this managed colony to reduce in size thru attrition as many other well-managed colonies in Brevard have done over the years. Allow the caregivers to do what they do best, manage the colony and trap, sterilize, vaccinate, and relocate only the newly dumped cats/kittens, since no one seems to be able to stop the illegal dumping of animals.

Your decision was based on biased and unproven scare tactics used by individuals and groups that want to end the lives of free-roaming cats by the trap-and-kill method vs the humane method of trap-neuter-return. Contrary to what so-called evidence the Indian Harbor Beach Council had that trapneuter-return does not work, there are many well managed colonies throughout Brevard County, Florida that are proof that it DOES work. The Brevard County Animal Advisory Board and many local animal advocates worked together for many months discussing the community/feral cat issues and the end result was that no change needed to be made to the County's feral cat ordinance. Blatantly ignoring all the time and effort put forth by the Animal Advisory Board and many residents of Brevard County simply makes no sense and gives the residents of Brevard County the idea that the Indian Harbor Beach Council believes they are the ONLY community/feral cat experts ... which

could be nothing further from the truth.

A total in excess of \$300,000 of arant funding has come into Brevard County from various sources to help with spay/neuter of both community and pet cats over the past 5 years (information compiled from Space Coast Feline Network, Brevard County Animal Services & Enforcement, Animal Guardians of Brevard, Suntree-Vierra Pet Rescue, SPCA of North Brevard, and Central Brevard Humane Society). There are many people and groups all over Brevard practicing TNR (trap-neuter-return) as it is the ONLY answer to our overpopulation problem of cats. Why would all this additional funding come into Brevard if the rest of the country and animal welfare organizations did not believe in TNR?

Relocation of community/feral cats rarely is successful due to the cats' instinct to try to find their way home. Most end up as roadkill or starve to death. Please reverse the decisions you made in January 2013 regarding free-roaming cats in Indian Harbor Beach. The community/feral cat caregivers should be thanked rather than fined for the service they provide FOR FREE to your community. Let Brevard County Animal Services do their job that taxpayers pay them to do ... if there is a nuisance issue, they can deal with it and try to resolve it in a humane manner.

As elected officials, I am sure you do not want to have Indian Harbor Beach, Florida to be added to the very small list of cathating, cat-killing communities.

Grief AND CHILDREN

Parents face many challenges in raising children; and one of the most difficult can be explaining death. Adults and children display grief in the same way by crying, getting angry, blaming themselves and not eating or sleeping. However, an adults experience of grief is distinguished from that of a child by the adults ability to separate fact from fantasy. Therefore, it is important to let a child know:

- 1. They will be cared for (fed, loved, sheltered)
- 2. They did not cause the death
- 3. What is happening, if possible, before the death
- 4. The facts about the cause of death
- 5. There is someone who will listen to them
- 6. There will be opportunities for honest interaction and involvement.

The expression of grief is a learned behavior. Our basic knowledge is learned within the family by observing the adults; their response to grief. A younger child looks for concrete answers that often have to be repeated and repeated. They experience grief in small increments, playing in between. Teenagers seek out a trusted adult. Just by being together, families can get comfortable and talking will follow. Talking helps a child to learn compassion, by feeling anothers pain and patience, by recognizing others do not grieve at the same speed.

There are many resources to help begin a discussion with children about death. Children's literature has several books for recommended reading.



Some titles include: <u>Fall of Freddie</u> <u>the Leaf</u>, <u>The Scar</u>, <u>The Brightest</u>, and <u>What's Heaven</u>. Adults need to preview the book so they are comfortable with the content before reading it with their child. The Internet is a fluid source of information. Local Hospice programs have available competent, compassionate professionals who specialize in children's grief. Locally, there is Bright Star (733-7672) and North Star (269-4240). Parental, adult participation is an expectation.

Utilizing these resources, helps a child grow in awareness that death is a natural, normal event. For parents, it helps to encourage the healing of our children through their grief.

I especially noticed his flirtatious little baby-tooth smile flashing my way right before he reached out his gummy banana fingers for the laptop that I'd been doing my writing on. A couple of unsuccessful attempts later, I decided that probably I ought to close the lid before he learned to evade his mother's restraint. I'm not sure whether he was seeking a place to wipe those 'nanner fingers, or whether he just has a thing for computers. Maybe both. It occurred to me that I should offer to

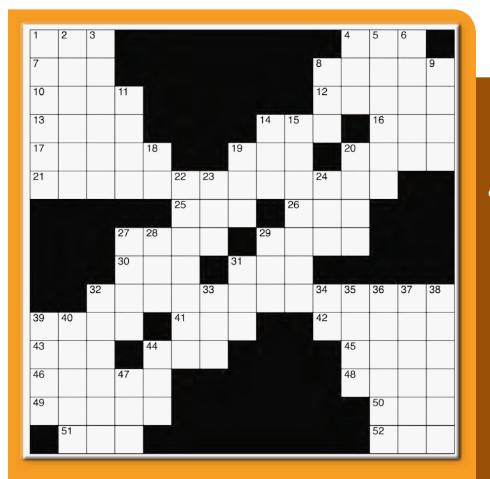

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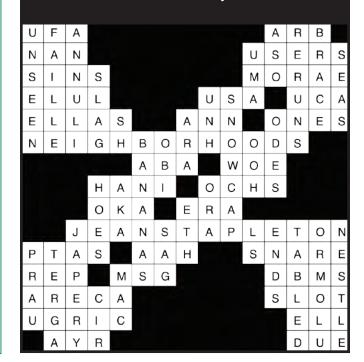
