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PAY YOUR RESPECTS

A few years ago, the week before Father's Day, I stood beside a hospital bed with another minister, and watched an old man breathe his last. There was no thunder clap... no movie soundtrack to heighten the emotional effect... just a breath and it was over. Stunned, the first words in my head were "well, that's it"... it was the first and only time I've seen someone die... then I cried like a baby. I had just lost the greatest support I'd ever known... I'd lost my father... just like that.

One thing I remember about my father was the degree to which he was respected in our community. At the funeral home, the line of people, who began lining up outside 30 minutes before the doors opened, walked by continually. We never had to move or sit down and we stayed an extra hour to accommodate them all. Sounded like a lot of fuss for a plain farmer who had picked cotton for 25 cents a day to buy his books to finish high school, his highest academic achievement. I'll never forget this 16 year old boy walking up to Ma and me. Ryan worked for my Dad doing odd jobs around the farm. He listened to what Dad said and my Dad listened to him and I don't think that I've ever seen raw emotion like that from a boy of his age in person.

Ephesians 5:33 says "wives are to see to it that they respect their husbands." While this seems like a marital verse, it also speaks to the way that God designed all men. Men were designed to value respect and honor at a high level. Actually, respect is the foundation for their understanding of love. This insight is something for all of us to remember when dealing with those men in our lives. Too often, respect can be ignored as an optional concept and the men that we value never truly understand how much they mean to us.

My Dad was lucky since he died knowing what he meant to his family and the people that came that night. The funeral was just a final outpouring of the respect and love he'd earned in his life. I hope that we all don't neglect the men in our lives, and that we don't wait for the funeral home to "pay our respects".

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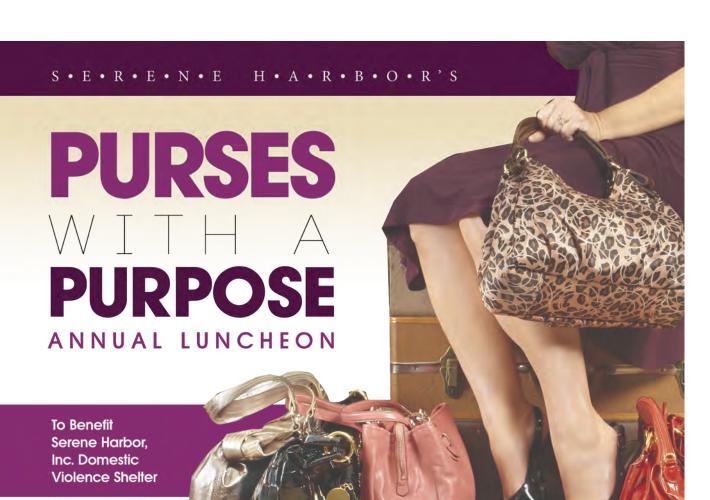
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What is Women's Fascination WITH Purses?

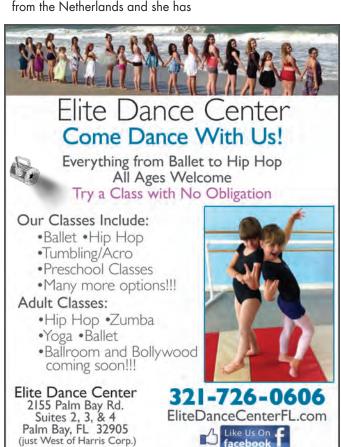

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The Secret to Handling Tough Conversations

Do you know a person you need to have a conversation with and have not be looking forward to it? Possibly, you have tried it before and it went poorly. Maybe you are afraid that speaking with them is only going to make matters worse. For whatever the reason, you can feel the tension. One of the most frequent obstacles to real conversation is that people do not know where to start. A life coach can work with you to help your

relationships get beyond the mediocre especially during difficult conversations.

You will have to say things in a respectful way, even if you think the other person isn't deserving. What if you want to address a problem and the other person does not. It may be tempting to demand or confront the person. What should you do if you must have a tough conversation about an important matter but the other person resists. If you are more cheerful person or upbeat personality or if you are at a differing levels of responsibility or authority this can make communication more difficult. You should respect other person and be willing listen. You should keep this in mind when your in a ugly conversation, the goal is to resolve whatever issue is between us

Leaders know it is paramount to have people who want to share and accomplish the goals of the team. However, there are some people seem to always be having difficult conversations. And then



there are some people avoid challenging conversations because they are uncomfortable with conflict. They feel it is not worth the effort or are concerned that they will hurt the relationship if they speak out.

Here are four things to remember:

Do not leave too much time between the incident and talking about it.

Try to learn as much as possible about the other's point of view. Do not have a preconceived ideas.

Acknowledge what they say and do not interrupt.

Desire to make things right and make it clear to them.

The best way to handle tough conversations with others is to avoid getting into them. That is not always feasible and certainly not probable. Following these simple guidelines in your tough conversations will lead to relationships based on trust and respect. The conversation like any art is improved by making the basics good habits. Using the basic skills describe here will improve conversations. Just remember, the ultimate goal is to resolve the problem and maintain the relationship.

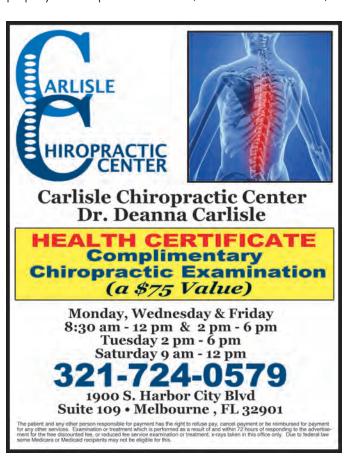
SPOTLIGHT ON CHIROPRACTIC HEALTH

At least 70 percent of America's 30 million elementary school students use computers, according to a recent New York Times article. As a result of this increased usage, doctors of chiropractic are treating more young patients suffering from the effects of working at computer stations that are either designed for adults or poorly designed for children. Many children are already suffering from repetitive motion injuries (RMI) such as carpal tunnel syndrome and chronic pain in the hands, back, neck and shoulders.

A recently published study conducted by a team of researchers from Cornell University found that 40 percent of the elementary school children they studied used computer workstations that put them at postural risk. The remaining 60 percent scored in a range indicating "some concern."

"Emphasis needs to be placed on teaching children how to properly use computer workstations," stated Dr. Scott Bautch,





a member of the American Chiropractic Association's Council on Occupational Health. "Poor work habits and computer workstations that don't fit a child's body during the developing years can have harmful physical effects that can last a lifetime. Parents need to be just as concerned about their children's interaction with their computer

workstations as they are with any activities that may affect their children's long-term health," added Dr. Bautch.

What can you do?

To reduce the possibility of your child suffering painful and possibly disabling injuries, the American Chiropractic Association (ACA) and its Council on Occupational Health offer the following tips:

- If children and adults in your home share the same computer workstation, make certain that the workstation can be modified for each child's use.
- Position the computer monitor so the top of the screen is at or below the child's eye level. This can be accomplished by taking the computer off its base or stand, or having the child sit on firm pillows or phone books to reach the desired height.
- Make sure the chair at the workstation fits the child correctly.
 An ergonomic back cushion, pillow or a rolled-up towel can be placed in the small of the child's back for added back support. There should be two inches between the front edge of the seat and the back of the knees. The chair should have arm supports so that elbows are resting within a 70- to 135-degree angle to the computer keyboard.
- Wrists should be held in a neutral position while typing not angled up or down. The mousing surface should be close to the keyboard so your child doesn't have to reach or hold the arm away from the body.

Dear Val,

If Christians and Jews worship the same God, then it should stand to reason that Allah is the same God. After all, Ishmael and Hagar worshipped the God of Abraham and that's where the Muslim faith began. Isn't it possible that Allah is just another name for God—like Jehovah or Yahweh?

Dear Christy,

While it's true Ishmael and Hagar worshipped Jehovah, the God of Abraham, the Judeo-Christian God and Allah are not the same. The Muslim faith wasn't established until centuries later. Mohammad, father of the Muslim faith, was born in AD 570. He was orphaned at the age of six and raised by his paternal grandfather. When Mohammad grew up, he became a camel driver and eventually a merchant. He was described by his son-in-law as strikingly handsome and charismatic.

After meditating in a cave outside of Mecca (present day Saudi Arabia), forty-year-old Mohammad claimed to receive messages from god which later formed the verses of the Qu'ran (also spelled Koran and Al-Qur'an). During this era, the Arabian world worshipped more than 360 different gods—one for each day of the lunar year. Allah was one of a variety of names for the moon-god, the male complement to the female sun-god and was the favorite of Mohammad's family.

Muslims regard the Qu'ran as the divine word of god just as Christians look upon the Bible as absolute truth inspired by the Holy Spirit, in other words—the divine word of God. After examining the characteristics of the God of the Bible and the Allah of the Qu'ran you will understand, they are nothing alike and should never be viewed as such.

The Allah of the Qu'ran is considered, by Muslims, to be so exalted that he cannot be known, and their theology says Allah can never be understood and to even think he is spirit is demeaning and blasphemous. He has no emotional feelings toward man and there is no Savior or intercessor for the forgiveness of sin. One of Mohammad's claim is Allah commanded him to fight people until they became Muslims; consequently, Mohammad urged jihad on the infidels and this practice is still going on today (Surah 4:47; 9:29, Qu'ran).

In contrast, the Judeo-Christian God is knowable and a personable-being with intellect. The God of the Bible is spirit, one God—and made up of three persons (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit). God is love and full of mercy and grace. He is our shepherd, comforter, healer, and ever-present helper. He defends the weak, and gives strength to the powerless. God's will is that none should perish (2 Peter 3:9). "None" includes the Muslim people because God loves and cares for them too. Summer Squash Sloppy Joes

1 pound ground lean beef	1 6-ounce can tomato				
or furkey	paste	Kosher salt and ground black pepper to taste 3 ounces cheddar cheese, thinly sliced 6 hamburger buns (If you don't eat, put it over brown			
1/2 onion, finely chopped (about 3/4 cup)	3 garlic cloves, minced				
1 carrot, chopped	1 tablespoon mild chili				
1 1/2 cups summer					
1 1/2 cups summer squash, diced	1 teaspoon paprika				
	1 teaspoon dried oregano	rice)			

In a large skillet over medium-high heat, sauté the ground beef or turkey until browned, about 7 minutes. Add the onion and sauté 2 minutes. Add the carrot and sauté 2 minutes. Add the squash and sauté 1 minute more.

Stir in the tomato paste and 1 1/2 cups water, stirring until the paste has dissolved. Add the garlic, chili powder, paprika, and oregano, and season with the salt and pepper. Reduce heat to medium and continue to cook until the mixture has thickened, 8 to 10 minutes. Divide the cheese among the bottom halves of the hamburger buns. Transfer both halves of the buns to the broiler, open-faced, and toast until the cheese has melted and the top buns are toasted. Remove the buns from the oven and fill each sandwich with the squash-and-meat mixture. Serve immediately. Serve with a salad or baked beans.

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TIPS FOR 'CUTTING THE CORD' AND SAVING MONEY

The term 'cord cutter' refers to households that have discontinued using traditional cable and satellite providers for television content that have discontinued using traditional cable and satellite providers for television content and have moved completely to the Internet. While the lure of cutting the expense for these services is obvious, the notion that you can have the same experience and options purely from the Internet is untrue for the time being.

There are no current Internet-only options that will replicate 100% of what you are used to getting from the traditional providers: The good news is that you likely don't use 100% of what they are delivering anyway.

If you're willing to change your viewing behavior (like having to wait to see new episodes of a hit show) and sacrifice some convenience, you may be able to completely 'cut the cord' but I know of very few people that have actually pulled it off.

Most people are currently engaged in 'cord shaving' instead of 'cord cutting,' meaning they reduce what they are paying the traditional providers and find streaming alternatives for some of the premium or on-demand content. What you want to be able to see will determine how far you can go, so you need to start by making a list of shows and stations that are 'must haves.'

If local television programming is important, you'll want to start by experimenting with various HD antennas that allow you to get over-the-air HD broadcasts for free. A basic HD antenna will cost you \$20 to \$40, but I haven't seen too many that get all the stations clearly, especially if you live near tall buildings or mountains or far away from the transmitters.

Amplified HD antennas that cost \$60 to \$80 may help, or you may have to have a rooftop antenna installed, which can run \$300-\$500 or more depending upon your situation. This may make sense if you have a large number of TV sets that need HD antennas.

If live sports from ESPN are important, you'll either have to have a basic cable/satellite package or an Xbox 360 with an Xbox Live Gold account (http://goo.



gl/81P5Ot). If you don't care about sports or local programming, you can get lots of movies and TV shows from settop streaming devices such as Apple TV or a Roku Box (\$50 to \$100). These are easy to setup and use.

You'll also need to get a subscription for an all-you-can-eat streaming service such as Netflix (\$7.99 per month - http://goo.gl/1tDFml), Hulu Plus (\$7.99 per month - http://goo.gl/DeRNNO) or, if you already have an Amazon Prime account (http://goo.gl/GtUJqb), you have access to their 40k+ library of movies and TV episodes included in your membership.

You won't be able to see any of HBO's popular original series like Game of Thrones or Newsroom on these streaming services, so make sure you understand what the limitations are before you cut the cord. This shift to online delivery of traditional content is continuing to grow and many interesting new ways of watching what you want, when you want it, are continuing to appear.

Google recently announced their \$35 Chromecast streaming device (http://goo.gl/Ll4CyW), which allows cord cutters to use their smartphone or tablet to push Netflix, YouTube, and Google Play video up to a television. A company called Aereo (https://aereo.com) is offering an innovative way to get broadcast television over the Internet if you're lucky enough to be in one of their early markets.

Cutting the cord will require you to be flexible and willing to flop around different devices and different remotes, as well as be willing to miss out on some popular shows, but it will save you a bundle if you can make these changes to your viewing habits.

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PROTECTING SMARTPHONE PHOTOS

SPOTLIGHT ON SOCIAL MEDIA

There has been a video from NBCActionNews: http://bit. ly/17fraH2 re-circulating on the different social media sites

that warn about taking precautions when snapping photos with your smart phone before emailing or uploading them to websites, blogs or social networks. Take heed and listen to this WARNING!

There is a geo-tracking technology on your smart phone that embeds GPS information into the pictures which could threaten the safety of you, your children, or person(s) in the photo. The geo-tracking works exactly like the GPS system you have in your car, showing where the photo was taken, translating the location into a map of the exact spot where the picture was taken. You don't have to be a hacker to find out this information, all it takes is a simple right click on the photo and you then can find home, work or even child's school. Pretty scary!





You can be perfectly safe though if you make sure your photos are clean before you upload them, you just need to deactivate your geo-tracking on your smart phone before taking pictures and uploading them online. If your children have their own cell phones, be sure to go in and turn off the GPS settings on their phones. Talk with your children about online safety and teach them to never take pictures that show street names or home address numbers. It is also a good practice to set the privacy settings yourself on all of your kids' online accounts so you are comfortable with what they are sharing.

To turn off the GPS on your Smart phone when taking pictures:

iPhone – Go to Settings, then Privacy Location Services, turn it off for everything or just for the camera.

Android – Go to Settings, then Location Services and turn GPS off when you don't need it.

Windows Phone – Go to Settings, then Location and turn off Location Services.

If you have trouble remembering to turn off the GPS settings on your smart phone before taking photos, you can use PixelGarde.com, a photo privacy editor app that will check photos before you post them online.

To clean a large group of pictures at one time, use XnView. com, a nifty, image batch converter that can be used by both Mac and Window users.

The main thing to remember is to always keep your personal photos that you post online restricted to private!



Stereo is for more than Music

Gimme Shelter

Its Rainey season and the little ones have to find dry places to hide during the storm. Generally the cats are bright enough to find a dry, clean area to camp out, but there are some steps you should take to ensure that it is also safe.

After a rain inspect your colony; are the cats dry, wet or "Drowned Rat"? If they are dry you need to figure out if where they are hiding is safe for a cat.

Look around for culverts, shed's, heavy shrubs etc. Just making sure that the cats don't face injury, and that they are not "trespassing" in a structure that could cause someone to file a complaint against the colony.

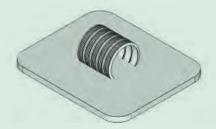
If they are wet you are going to have to provide some form of shelter for them. Remember that you want your colony to be as inconspicuous as possible, so whatever you choose make sure it blends in or is out of sight totally.

Rubbermaid tubs: Cutting two holes in a Rubbermaid tub is fast, easy, and normally free. I see these things in the trash or on the side of the road all the time. Periodically change out the bedding with straw, cardboard, or clean newspaper *Cats prefer two entrances so they don't feel trapped.

Lean-to: Leaning plywood or some other solid flat piece of material against a tree is simple and effective.

Half a barrel: cut an old garbage can in half, (wash it real good too), and cut a second entrance hole in the bottom.

Tire Tunnel: If you have a colony in a more secure area like your own yard, a sturdy shelter for the little ones is a tire tunnel. A tire tunnel is a series



of used tires arranged side by side so they create a tunnel, then they are half buried in the ground to give added stability.

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Measles: ON THE RISE

There has been an increased incidence of Measles seen in the United States due to international travel.

In August, 2011 there was an outbreak in California associated with an arriving refugee from Burma. Passengers on the flight included 31 other refugees who then traveled to seven other states, widening the potential for measles. This caused 17 measles outbreaks in various U.S. communities.

Measles is a highly contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus. This disease is also called Rubeola. Measles grows in the lining of the back of the throat and lungs.

The symptoms of Measles are fever, runny nose, cough, eye drainage, and a red rash all over the body. About one out of 10 children also get an ear infection, and up to 20 get pneumonia.

About one out of 1,000 get encephalitis, and one or two out of 1,000 die.



Measles spreads through the air by breathing, coughing or sneezing. It is so contagious that any child who is exposed to it and is not immune will probably get the disease. Children, teenagers, and adults should be up to date on their measles vaccination, including before they leave for international travel.





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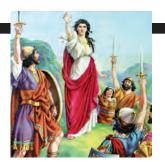






DEBORAH THE PROPHETESSES

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When we think of Biblical Prophets, we think of great men like Elijah, Isaiah and even Jesus Himself. But there were many Prophetesses, such as Anna, Miriam, and Philip's four daughters. I think the greatest of all the Prophetesses was Deborah.

Deborah was the fourth Judge to lead the nation of Israel. (Judges 4:1 – 5:31.) Because she was a Judge, she was also the commander-in-chief of the Israeli army. She is pictured in the Bible in a very positive light, boldly speaking in the name of the Lord and sought out for her decisions.

The Israelites frequently got into trouble back then, falling into wickedness and idolatry, so God would punish them with oppression and bondage until they repented. It's easy to see how often this happened, because Judges 4:1 begins like this: "Again the Israelites did evil in the eyes of the Lord..." This time, God gave them over to the king of Canaan for twenty years. Finally, God tells Deborah to engage the cruel Canaanite general, Sisera, and He will give them victory. So she calls her own general, Barak, and orders him to take some men and go to battle.

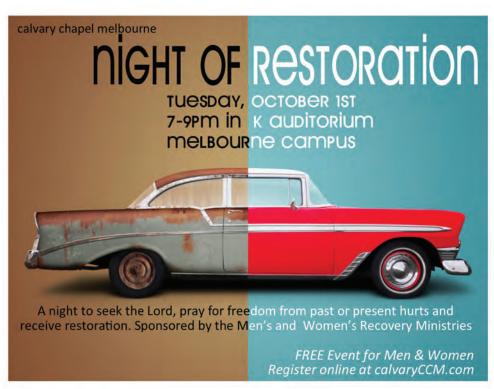
But Barak refuses to do this unless Deborah goes with him (Barak comes off as kind of a sissy here.) Because of his demand, she prophesies that the glory for defeating Canaan's general will not go to him, but instead, it is a woman who will defeat the brutal Sisera.

Here's where the story gets really interesting. Barak leads the charge against the army of Canaan, but the Bible tells us that it is God who wins the battle: "...the Lord routed Sisera and all his chariots and army by the sword..." (Judges 4:15) During the confusion of the attack, Sisera himself fled to the tent of his friend Heber the Kenite, where Heber's wife hid him under a blanket. Sisera fell asleep, exhausted.

Then Jael, Heber's wife, picked up a tent peg and a hammer, and drove the peg through Sisera's temple into the ground! No way! How motivated would you have to be to ram a tent pole through somebody's head? But Jael did it, and then showed Sisera's dead body to Barak, the Israeli general, and it is she who got the glory for the defeat, just as Deborah had prophesied.

Judges 4:23-24 tells us how the story ends. "On that day God subdued Jabin king of Canaan before the Israelites. And the hand of the Israelites pressed harder and harder against Jabin king of Canaan until they destroyed him." This was followed by forty years of peace for Israel.

Its cool stories like this that make me wonder why more people don't avidly read the Bible. And why Hollywood producers pay good money to option books, when they could make awesome movies about people like Deborah and Jael from the Bible. If you haven't read your Bible lately, pick it up and read a few chapters today!

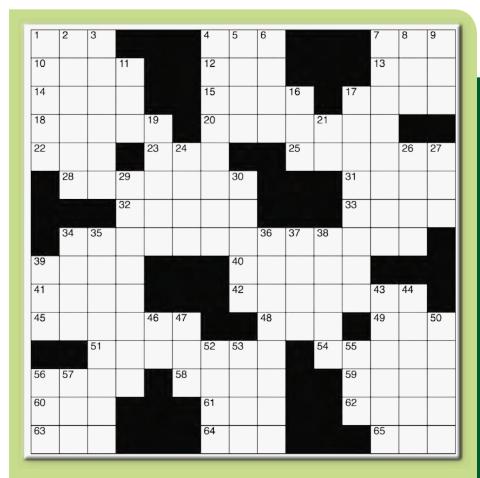
3. What do you need to "prune" out of your life? Example: Do you set boundaries with people? Do

Don't Let the Flu Catch You!

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends all persons aged six months or older receive annual influenza vaccinations. It is especially important those people with chronic medical conditions, pregnant women,



people 65 years and older, and those working in health care receive a flu vaccine.

Plan early to get your flu shot this season. The vaccination may be offered at your doctor's office, pharmacy, health department and urgent care clinic.
